Wearing Masks & LFT

As you are aware from yesterday, Thursday 27 January, most of the national Covid measures are being relaxed. This means that it will no longer be necessary for pupils, staff or visitors to wear masks in communal areas in school, but anyone who wishes to continue wearing a mask may do so.

Please note that the government suggests that you **continue to wear a face covering in crowded and enclosed spaces which includes public and dedicated school transport**. We therefore request all pupils in Years 7 to 11 to **continue to wear a mask on our school minibuses** unless they are exempt.

We would ask that all pupils in Years 7 to 11 and all staff continue to carry out the twice-weekly Lateral Flow Tests. In addition, we will continue to ensure communal areas are well ventilated and that good hand hygiene is followed at all times. *Mrs Witts*








What happens in The Hub?

Some of the pupils learned macramé and used this technique to make a special keyring for their friends and family. *Miss Blore*





House points - totals - Whole School









Local Residents' Virtual Coffee Morning




Study Centre Musings From the Top...

What did you do last Sunday? Did you write a shopping list? Or a 'to do' list for the week? Maybe you signed your name in a card for someone?

Sunday 23rd January was **National Handwriting Day**; it has been celebrated on this date each year since 1977. National Handwriting Day was started by the Writing Instrument Manufacturers Association as a way of promoting the use of pens, pencils and writing paper. This date was chosen as it was the birthday of John Hancock: the first person to sign the Declaration of Independence.

The art of handwriting has a long history, with the earliest known handwriting on clay tablets in Metopotamia around 3,300BC. Known as Cuneiform, these wedge-shaped marks appeared even earlier than Egyptian hieroglyphics. Today we favour a 'print' style or cursive handwriting: the ancient Greeks and Romans were the first to use a joined-up style of handwriting.



Amazon's best-selling pen is the classic Bic Cristal Original ball pen, closely followed by Kingswood House favourite, Pilot Frixion rollerball. The Bic Cristal is the best-selling pen in the whole world, first introduced in 1950. Pilot's Frixion pens are much younger than this, first launched in Europe in 2006. 



Reception have been learning about *Everyday Heroes* and this week we have been learning about the importance of delivery men/women.






Girls' Tea & Talk 3



9H Sustainability Assembly



Make Your Own Minibeast Hotel



Outdoor Activity

You will need:

A suitable container or area in your outdoor area, preferably wooden

Compost

Fertile soil

Pieces of wood (various sizes)

Different sized/shaped stones

Bricks

Old roof tiles

Clay drainage tubes

Fir cones

Dry leaves

Bark


Straw, hay

Dead wood/sticks

Plants that will attract insects

Method

1. Choose either an area in your outdoor area or a wooden container and place it on the ground.
2. If the container hasn't already got holes in, make some holes in the bottom. That will create drainage and let minibeasts crawl in.
3. Fill the container with compost and fertile soil.
4. Use your resources to build various places for minibeasts to live.
5. Woodlice and beetles will like wood/sticks and if stacked, the minibeasts can crawl through them.
6. Plants will attract the crawling bugs like caterpillars, snails and spiders.
7. Butterflies and bees will like nectar-rich flowering plants.
8. It's up to you how much you put in your bug hotel.
9. Observe the hotel over time and see which minibeasts it attracts.
10. Can you find out which areas each kind of minibeast like best?



A great idea from Miss Hylands for the weekend if you can get out and about in the garden... You can either make it for home or make one to bring into school. If you wish to bring it into school then it needs to be no bigger than 30cm's. For any other information come and see Miss Hylands
