



So, Shrove Tuesday was named after the custom of Christians to be 'shriven' before the start of Lent.





Dear parents—a note from our uniform supplier Stevensons regarding the girls' summer dress.



*“We have been informed by the manufacturers of your school’s Summer Dress, that any **custom orders must be placed with the brance / online by 30th June 2022 for delivery in time for back to school September 2022.** For any orders placed from 1st July 2022, our suppliers are advising of a 2023 due date. Please be assured that this is only applicable to the Summer Dress item, no other stock is affected as the majority demands are for Winter wear. As you may recall, a custom order is for a size outside of our standard stock range that we currently supply for the school. Most children will not fall outside of our stocked size range and so should not be affected, however we wanted to ensure that we communicated this with you and your parent body.*

We are adding additional notes to the garment affected on our website and our branches are informed so they may assist parents accordingly. If you have any queries, please do not hesitate to contact [Alexandra Pearson](#), Senior Account Manager Stevensons”.

Dear Parents

We listened with mixed feelings to the Prime Minister's announcement yesterday about the complete relaxation of Covid-19 isolation rules and please find attached a summary of the guidance.

After careful reflection, we consider that the responsible position for the school is to acknowledge and respect the government's decision, whilst requesting all of you to undertake additional voluntary measures to help safeguard the health and welfare of our community at Kingswood House.

We strongly suggest that you **continue to test your child at least twice-weekly (Years 7-11) and keep your son or daughter off school if they test positive and isolate for at least the advised 5 days.** On the basis of a shared agreement in this respect, we will authorise the teaching staff to maintain Teams access to lessons for pupils who have Covid-19 and are well enough.

Whilst it is our wish to try and help each and every individual circumstance, it is becoming increasingly difficult to do so and the cost to staff time and mental health is too exacting - so now is the time to draw a firm line in the sand moving forward so we all know what the expectations are.

For clarity:

- **Teams access to lessons will be permitted only for pupils who have Covid-19 and who are well enough.** N.B. Emergency situations (e.g. being stuck abroad or an act of God) will be considered on a case-by-case basis by the relevant Divisional Head and authorised or not by me.
- If a child is ill, they are ill. They should recuperate and then catch up work when they are back in school and feeling fit and healthy.
- If a child is away or absent from school for any other authorised reason, they can catch up work as required when they are back in school.

We do feel it is important that we now protect both the mental and physical well-being of our teaching and support staff who have, for many months, gone the extra mile to keep the school fully operational in a display of outstanding professionalism.


As ever, we would appreciate your full support and understanding in this matter so that we may keep a consistency of high-quality education flowing for the boys and girls.

Computer Science Enrichment



Sport and ICT Enrichment Spring Term 2022 Starting February 21st

During the five week half term ahead, Mr Hendry and Mrs Webb will be running a variety of enrichment activities based around their subjects with something for all our pupils, young and old, to engage with outside of lessons!

Pupils can choose to take part in as many options as they wish. A prize will be awarded at the end of term for the winning entry from each option; commendations will also be awarded where exemplary effort is seen.

Option 1

Create a PowerPoint presentation or a short movie about the Winter Olympics with particular focus on the **endeavour shown by the athletes**.

Option 2

Film and record **the number of miles you can run/walk** in five weeks.

Option 3

Create a 5 week circuit training program and perform and record it each week; even better if you can get others to join in with you!

Option 4

Design, perform and record a **dance routine**; this could be solo or with someone else.

'Steps Competition' starting on Monday 21st February to Friday 25th March

Each class will be issued with 2 pedometers and every day two pupils from the class measure how many steps they do. The amount of steps will be recorded and in the last week of term the steps will be counted on an electronic scoreboard the winners will be the form which has achieved the most steps.

The pre-prep department will be using the Bee Bot robots to find their way around a variety of sporting themed mats. They will be able to control the robots using directional language and programming.

This is a UK wide competition looking for young people with digital skills to be crowned 'Young Coder Crew 2022'




Dear Parent / Guardian,

Our school is assisting Surrey County Council's Safer Travel Team to help them recruit for Walking Instructors, as part of their new Walking Training programme for primary schools.



What is the Walking Training programme?

The Walking Training Programme is a road safety and active travel skills awareness course that will be aimed at children ages 7 to 8 years old (Year 3). It will provide pupils with road safety skills to better enable them to safely walk to and from school with their parents and carers and prepare them for independent travel. What is a Walking Instructor?

Surrey County Council are currently recruiting for several Surrey based Walking Instructors. Their aim is to provide primary school pupils with the necessary road safety skills and knowledge through a series of in-class and on-road training modules.

A Walking Instructor will be able to lead a small group of 7-8-year-old pupils in the playground and on the road, outside the school gates, to provide them with necessary road safety skills and knowledge. Delivering an informative, robust and entertaining programme of learning that highlights the necessary road safety skills, providing Year 3 pupils with the foundation to feel safe and comfortable as a pedestrian navigating Surrey's roads.

There are many benefits to becoming a Walking Instructor, including: being at the forefront of a new active and sustainable travel programme in Surrey; working with pupils to encourage walking to school and providing them with the necessary road safety skills. We will also provide you with a competitive salary, flexible working that can be based in and around the school day as well as full training, including safeguarding and First Aid.

Who would be an ideal Walking Instructor?



YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED

- Q. How old do you have to be to join the ACF?**
- A. You need to be at least 12 and in year 8 (or equivalent) at school to join the ACF. Cadets have to leave the ACF when they turn 18 years old.
- Q. What does it cost?**
- A. The ACF will provide your child with a uniform free of charge whilst they are in the cadets. It will need to be returned when they leave. You will need to buy a pair of sturdy boots. There may be a small weekly subscription for Detachment subs (usually a pound). Weekend and annual camps are usually on average £5 a day. This covers feeding and incidental costs.
- Q. On weekend and annual camps where do cadets stay?**
- A. Most weekends the cadets stay at Army camps in accommodation with beds and dining facilities. Cadets also spend a significant amount of time living in the field under tents or shelters. They are provided with sleeping bags, sleeping mats and waterproof clothing.
- Q. How do you make sure my child will be safe in your care?**
- A. We carry out formal safeguarding checks (DBS) to make sure every volunteer is safe to work with young people and they are not left unsupervised until all checks are complete. Also every ACF county has a full time Training Safety Advisor to ensure all training is safe and a full time Designated Child Safeguarding Officer who ensures that our safeguarding policy is adhered to.
- Q. Will my child have to join the Army if they become a cadet?**
- A. No. The ACF is sponsored by the Army but not part of it. There is absolutely no requirement on cadets to join any of the Armed Forces. As part of the ACF charter we stimulate an interest in the Army, its achievements, skills and values.
- Q. Which days and times do cadets meet?**
- A. Your local Detachment, 154, meet on a Tuesday between 1930 and 2130 Hours. Other Detachments may parade on different nights at different times. There is on average a weekend activity at a camp or training area once a month and annual camp is two weeks in the summer. Dates and times for all events are published at the Detachment and on our website.

My name is Pat Cullen and I am a Sargent in the Army Cadet Force, ACF Epsom detachment in your area of South West London. We are looking to recruit more young members—boys and girls—to join our cadet family and wondered if this would be of interest to any KHS pupils?

Patrick says the cadet force have a range of military subjects and life skills to learn at a basic level, as well as the chance to bond and meet new people of a similar age and interest
