



All four houses met together in their meeting rooms and learnt about Fairtrade. It is a unique campaign that aims to transform the banana industry to ensure the people in the supply chain and millions of struggling banana farmers and workers get a fair deal.



Did you know many banana farmers and workers have had their earnings cut as banana prices go down in the UK. Supermarkets want to pay as little as possible for the bananas to offer us the lowest price but this puts pressure on workers and farmers.

Fairtrade wants to make pricing work for both consumers and farmers. It is time for the government to help end these unfair prices. Buying bananas and other products that have the Fairtrade symbol on them means you know that a fair price has been paid to workers. Over 4500 different fair-trade products are now available to UK shoppers.

Make sure you look out for them next time you're doing your weekly shop! The boys and girls in each house learnt about these facts and many more. They watched a video on the campaign to help understand the importance and finished off with a Fairtrade quiz! *Miss Smith*




Many thanks to Dr Sevenoaks who gave up her time to come and talk to our Senior Pupils about the important topic of sexual health. This topic is part of the statutory learning guidance from the Department for Education (DfE) Education Acts of 2002 and 1996. It is designed to equip young adults with the emotional and social maturity to deal with relationships in increasingly complex world, both on and offline. Relationships Education is compulsory in all primary schools in England and Relationships & Sex Education compulsory in all secondary schools; age and developmentally appropriate resources and language should be used.




DT in Action!


Year 7s are learning all about soldering techniques with wires and components and will eventually be creating a simple circuit with a motor, switch and battery pack.






the Police, RNLI, Fire Brigade, Fearless (fighting against crime), Hope (equipping young people to make drug-free choices) and the Transport Police.




